I can't do anything much of anything until we get ahead of this disease. But I wanted her to know, and you all to know, I do understand her sacrifices for me, and her trying to get stuff accomplished. Saying that, I asked for another favor to be able to show my wife just how much she





another year, I decided to do something special for my wife on our 14th wedding anniversary. I planned a special dinner with friends at a nice restaurant for everyone. There, I would make my presentation and give my heartfelt speech to my wife.

As we were in the middle of dinner, a sevenfoot-tall man came into the restaurant. You could have heard a pin drop. Every eye was on him as he walked through and eventually came to our table. I stood and began my speech as follows:

"We are never promised tomorrow and that has never been more evident than today. I wanted to do something a little extra for my wife for our 14th Anniversary, just in case I do not get to do this again. Everyone knows by now that I have had two heart surgeries that put me out of action for some time. Then a month ago, we discovered I have bone cancer, and it's aggressive. My doctors are trying to get ahead of it so that we could possibly kick it into remission, but that's another story for another time.

Kristin & I have tremendous family and friends who have gone, and are going, above and beyond what has ever been asked of them, and I am so thankful for those people, most of them at this table right now. While I am at home and sick, not able to do normal stuff, all of those chores and tasks still have to get done. Being a care provider is usually

means to me. When we first met, I watched wrestling whenever it was on, and she would "watch" with me. After we got married, not so much. It may seem like a small gesture of what she has meant to me since we met that day at the Chrome Pony, but that's also when God intervened and told me to go and get her - that she would be my Champion for Life. The 2021 Budget year has closed and we continue to be healthy, finishing the year in the black. We finished last year a little more than \$58k in the black. The yearly audit was finished by the accounting firm, and I am glad to report we passed with flying colors. A copy of the audit can be found in the members only section of the website, along with the 2021 year-end report.

As we move into 2022, the budget has been approved and placed on the website for all to see. I would like to thank Luis Sosa (TX XLII) and Leonie Tromans (Eng XIII) for joining the committee this year, along with Jana, D.J. and myself. If you have any questions or concerns about the budget, please do not hesitate to reach out to me.

As all the U.S. Chapters know, it is time for the government to reach out for their cut. Chapter Treasurers need to remember to file the form 990. You can file electronically (990-N) if you have \$50,000 or less in annual gross receipts. For those that cannot file electronically, you must do the regular form 990. If you fail to file three (3) consecutive years, you will lose your tax-exempt status.

With the renewed effort on recruitment and retention, I would like to remind everyone that each conference has up to \$500 in reimbursement from the International available to them in the 2022 budget. This money is on a first-come first-served basis, unless your conference has additional rules in place for a more equitable distribution. The deadline for requesting a reimbursement for the 2022 budget funds is January 15, 2023.

The reimbursement process is simple. When your chapter spends money on recruitment and retention you can send your receipts and request to your Conference Treasurer. Once the Conference Board reviews and okays the request the Conference Treasurer simply emails the request with receipts directly to me. I will then review and approve it. The funds will then be sent directly to the chapter from the International. Please do not send the information to me directly; that will only delay the reimbursement while I send it back to you to resend through the proper channels.

The day started with the Chapter Officers of New Hampshire IV leading a ride of more than 30





Cross Country Colors

As I read through the issue of Sword & Shield that arrived in December, I was struck by a comment made by N. American Vice President, Roy MacConnel. In a greeting he talked briefly about recruitment and included this comment, " ... so get out, get active, wear your Blue Knight vest, and RIDE Wear your Blue Knight vest. Such a simple thing,

that is often the source of much discussion and controversy in the organization. When should we wear it? Should I wear it when riding alone? What if someone says something about it? It's so hot when I wear it. Our motto is "Ride with Pride". Nothing shows our pride more than wearing our colors. So when the International meeting got moved again due to COVID, and we decided that three executive board members of Virginia II would ride out to Prescott, Arizona to attend the 2021 meeting, Secretary/Treasurer John Burns and I put an idea we had been working on into action.

Prescott, Arizona in July...did someone say hot? Knowing that we would be riding in some extreme heat, John and I finally got around to ordering the mesh vests we had talked about getting for a while. Our chapter does a lot of rides with our brothers and sisters of Virginia I. In 2019 I rode up to a Summer Christmas charity event hosted by New York V with the president of Virginia I, Vic Calloway, and Iceman. I wore my leather vest the whole time while Vic and Iceman wore their black mesh Virginia I vests. To say I was jealous of the ventilation their vests provided would be an understatement. A seed was planted... John and I ordered our new blue mesh vests along with a set of reflective colors. A couple of weeks before our departure, everything arrived and we were ready to Ride with Pride.

On July 2, my ride began as I donned my new colors and pointed my bike south to head to an academy classmate's home in northwest Georgia. John and our chapter President, Bob Robertson, would start the following day and we planned on meeting up in Chattanooga, Tennessee. Some members of my chapter, who knew we were heading out to Prescott asked about wearing colors. "Will you guys be wearing them all the way out there, or just when you get there?" It's a typical discussion. Personally, anytime I am going to, coming from, or participating in any event that is, or could be associated with the Blue Knights and Law Enforcement, I wear my colors. Riding alone to a Chapter meeting? Colors on. Riding alone to Memphis. Tennessee for the Mason-Dixon Conference meeting? Colors on. Riding up to New York V's charity event with Virginia I? Colors on. Riding in Law Ride or the Officer Down Memorial Ride? Colors on. Riding to a law enforcement funeral? Colors on. You get the picture.

Speaking of getting the picture. About 15 years ago, I put getting a picture of my motorcycle in front of a "welcome to" every state in the lower 48 on my bucket list. In 2015, I checked that goal off my bucket list as I got a picture of my 2011 Kawasaki Voyager in front of every single one that year. Having grown accustomed to stopping at the "welcome to" signs, I modified that into a new bucket list item. Now I am on the quest to get a picture of my bike with my colors in

front of every "welcome to" state sign, and I am making good progress. Now back to the ride to Prescott...

I was happy to see Bob and John in the Cracker Barrell when Will and

I arrived. Reason 1, they already

had a table and we didn't have to wait in the growing line; Reason 2, our ride was officially beginning; Reason 3, they were wearing their colors. Let's ride!

After our breakfast, we pointed the bikes west. Our route had us pretty much avoiding the interstates as much as practical. I got the group into the new bucket list mission and we started stopping at the "welcome to" state signs and other interesting signs and places to take pictures of our bikes with our colors. As the

temperatures went up, a pattern began to form and Bob would remove his traditional leather colors between the signs. Even with vest extenders allowing air in, the extra laver of leather is great in cool/cold weather but can become unbearable on a hot summer ride.

John and I kept ours on for the duration of our ride. Along the way, people

passing by would sometimes toot their horns and give us a thumbs up, or our gas stops would get extended as we talked with troopers, deputies, and officers from state and local departments along the way. While I can't say that our conversations got any of them to reach out to their local chapters and maybe join, I do know that conversations like these go a long way for promoting our organization among the law enforcement community.

Several times along the way we would be in a restaurant or in a gas station and hear someone say, "Blue Knights huh?" The first time we heard this we turned a bit wary not knowing who we were dealing with. But as the ride progressed, we realized that the 1% encounters, like the 1% themselves, are few and far between. Most of the people who acknowledged us were fellow Knights, or former Knights or were law enforcement or had family in law enforcement. We met a few former Honoraries who spoke of their time with their chapters with pride. We directed a few relocated former Knights to the International web page to find a local Chapter and re-establish their membership.

While some people knew who we were, others asked what the vests meant. We would explain our organization and the people would generally thank us for what we do and leave knowing about the Blue Knights. I think all of this is why Rory included that benign comment in his December greeting to us,

"wear your Blue Knight vest, and RIDE.'

Standing on a corner in Winslow, Arizona —we were a fine sight to see. And we were seen wearing our colors. We were seen by several people walking past as we took pictures at the famous corner. We also

seen by Sherriff Mark Lamb, of Pinal County, Arizona. Sherriff Lamb was in town shooting film for his television show and, largely because we were easily identified as friendly brothers in law enforcement, we got to chat with him, and got pictures with him on the corner. Our interaction with Sherriff Lamb probably wouldn't have happened if we were just three guys riding motorcycles. Our colors identified us and provided us with commonalities and discussion points as he asked about the organization. So, whatever

Arizona chapter covers Pinal County, reach out to him, ask him about Winslow, and try to recruit some of his deputies. A gas stop in Winslow was also the only place along the way that we heard anything negative about our Colors. Bob and John were inside and a patron saw their

colors and kind of scoffed. He asked them what the local outlaw motorcycle gang would have to say about the

three-piece patches. Apparently, this guy had tried to form a small motorcycle club and was approached by the OMG and convinced to do away with their three-piece patch. While we did see an occasional OMG member sporting their colors along the way, there were no exchanges, except for the wary eyes on one another and a nod of acknowledgement to a





fellow rider.

When we got to the Grand Canyon, it was HOT. The weather apps said it was 113 degrees, the thermometer on my bike

was nearly pegged at 120 in the sun. We walked the canyon rim in our colors, and were proud to see a fellow Knight, Myron Joseph, New York IX and Tri State Conference Vice Chairman wearing his Tri-State colors as he walked the rim with his family. Riding in the heat, Bob took off his colors when he could to try to cool off, but John and I kept ours on as the mesh made it like we weren't even wearing them. The mesh vests were a good investment!

When we got to the International meeting, several people asked John and I about our vests. A seed was planted. That seed would be nurtured at the Blue Ridge Rally in September. The Blue Ridge Rally is the longest standing rally in the organization and is hosted by our Chapter each Labor Day weekend as we host the fall meeting of the Mason Dixon Conference. If you haven't been to one, put that on your bucket list! John and I wore our vests throughout our Rally as well and several people asked about our blue mesh vests. As a result, we have obtained a permit to sell them in our catalog, so, inserting a shameless plug in this article, if you want a mesh vest in blue, black or high-viz, visit our website for details on ordering!

Now, back to our cross-country adventure already in progress. Personally, I am fond of our original baby blue, and the blue of our mesh vests over the black or dark blue leather. Why? Because it easily identifies us even from a distance. Anyone who knows anything about motorcycle clubs knows that the blue vests identifies the rider as a

I remember the first time I saw Blue Knights' colors. I was driving with my dad down the Merritt Parkway in Connecticut when three Goldwings passed by us.





take a picture. But traffic ahead started slowing fast, braking hard actually. Vehicles were going to the shoulders, and I noticed the west bound lanes were behaving the same way. Looking over to the west bound lanes we saw the car that had just come to rest after tumbling over a couple of times. Without much thought, all three of us knew what the others were doing. There was a cut through just ahead, I activated the strobes on my bike that I use while providing escorts for triathlons and marathons and took the lead while Bob and John hit their hazards. Surprisingly, the traffic in the west bound lanes saw us and stopped to let us through the crossover and across all lanes to run down the shoulder. We were all surprised with how fast three old guys dismounted and ran to the occupants of the car. With our trauma kits in hand, we tried our best to keep them both still, though the young girl was too excited to sit still. The driver, a young 21-year-old guy, looked worse than he was. He was covered with blood, and likely had a bad concussion. Looking at what was left of the car, it was

nothing short of a miracle. We helped the young man stop the bleeding and clean his wounds until the rescue squad arrived. Again, with the three of us wearing our colors, we were easily identified as the helping hands we were. We briefly talked to the responding deputy who thanked us for stopping and helping before we packed up our kits and rode off.

It's funny, I've been a Blue Knight for over 10 years and never really thought of that long-ago conversation with my dad until we were pulling away from the scene of that wreck. As I thought of this, I realized that the next





OK, we got this far, time for another shameless plug. Anyone who rides with John or me quickly realizes that we have a thing about visibility. While we always practice the theory of riding like we are invisible to others, we both are believers of adding lights and reflective materials to our

bikes to make them more visible. We ran to Madrid, New Mexico, yeah that Madrid, of Wild Hogs fame. We just had to visit Maggie's Diner. Due to the activity of the day, by the time we got there, the diner was closed. But since it's not really a diner, rather is a souvenir shop, we found another place to grab dinner, the Mine Shaft Tavern. While it didn't earn the top spot as "Best Food of Trip", that distinction went to the Cowboy Café in Roswell, New Mexico, it was definitely "Best Dinner of Trip". Leaving Madrid, well satiated from the amazing burger, it was dark out. I was riding third man with Bob leading and John between us. I have to say the reflective colors that Wisconsin XI provides really light up at night and make the rider so much more visible. If you are on the fence about ordering them, do it! You won't be sorry.

I must say that wearing our Colors across country added a whole new dimension to the ride. The conversations they sparked, the thumbs up of passer-bys, the sense of pride they gave, all contributed to the 15 days on the bike being one of the best motorcycle trips I have had. Of course, the company I was travelling with had a lot to do with the success of the trip, but the colors definitely added to the experience. My story doesn't end with the end of our 6,317 mile journey. Not long after we got back home, I got word of the passing of one of my State Police Academy classmates who had succumbed to COVID. The funeral was a good 7 hours away in southwest Virginia, so I put on my colors, got on my bike and rode down. While stopped to gas up and take care of business about 4 hours down the road, I was standing at a urinal in a vulnerable position when I heard a voice behind me, "Blue Knights huh? Not being much of a conversationalist while doing what I was doing I just nodded and said, "Yes, sir". As I was finishing up, he said, "You guys are the good guys" and went on to tell me about his son who, when he was a motor officer was involved in a bad wreck many years ago. He said the Blue Knights Chapter in the area did a fund raiser and helped take care of him. The man said his son was outside and he wanted to introduce me to him and his grandson. I was humbled by the charity of my predecessors as he introduced me to them and told the story of how the Blue Knights helped. The story he told his grandson, who was about 13-14 years old, reminded me of how my dad portrayed the Blue Knights to me so many years ago. The crash had happened a few years before I became a Blue Knight. When I realized that the guy was from northern Virginia and the chapter that helped him was my own chapter, I couldn't have been prouder. This moment would never have happened had I not been "Riding With Pride" and wearing my colors.

So what is it about wearing our Colors that turns some of off? If it is the whole 1% thing, is there some truth to that? Yes. Is there an inherent risk associated with identifying as law enforcement when you are just out riding? Yes. Is there a way to take away the mystique of the three-piece patch, or at least get it to not be associated primarily with OMGs? I think there is.



The first way easy, we are the 99%. We don't succumb to the vocal minority and we wear our colors with pride. The next way may be to legitimize the three-piece patch. Get it associated with the good guys and the 1% will find another way to represent. How you ask? Another one of my state police academy classmates has done quite well for himself and is highly ranked within the department. Being a former motor man, I ran an idea by him. What if police departments started using three-piece patches for their motor officers. Reflective patches on the back "State Police", "Motor Officer", "Deputy Sherriff" or whatever across the upper rocker, their badge, municipal seal, the motorman's winged wheel or something similar in the middle, and the name of their locality on the bottom rocker: Marketing, that's what it's about. If enough departments were able to do this, especially larger departments, the bad boy image of the three-piece patch would quickly change to be associated with the good guys, leaving the 1% to find another way to identify themselves.

Each of us needs to make a conscious decision about the risk, as we do every day about many things, and weigh the risk with the benefits. For me, the benefits, both for me and for the organization, outweigh what I view as a minimal risk. So anytime I am riding to, from, or in any ride even remotely associated with law enforcement, I will be riding with pride and wearing my Blue Knight colors.

Europe

Being a retiree and living in Colorado, two years of COVID lockdown and no travels, my Wanderlust had returned! With COVID finally on the wane, and Germany opening her Borders, I planned a quick trip to the Alps for May 2021. However, it soon extended from Luxembourg to Italy, and north to Gdansk, Poland. I picked up my bike in Heidelberg and rode to my favorite Penzion. nestled between the Austrian Alps and the Italian Dolomites. It provides wonderful mountain roads and the opportunity to be misunderstood in two different languages! I rode the Austrian mountain passes and lounged by Glaciers. When the weather brought a cold driving rain, I had only to journey a half hour south, over the Dolomites,

to explore the warmer regions of Italy.

I arrived at the Penzion Stockmühl late, due to weather, but was unexpectedly greeted by Huub, a brother Knight (Netherlands 2), with a cold beer. During his stay he learned, from the owner, of my unplanned visit and posted it on a BK Facebook Page. The owner

welcomed me with a warm platter of steak and potatoes and her cell phone. She had just received a call from another Knight, J.B. Pohl (Germany 12), inviting me to join his Go East

group touring Slovakia, Poland, and Czech Republic. So, my two-week vacation suddenly became four.

my two-week vacation suddenly became four.
I spent my first week motorcycling porth, over the Alps, or south

motorcycling north, over the Alps, or south, over the Dolomites depending on the weather. I spent an entire day traversing, and returning, Grossglockner Pass. Grossglockner is Austria's highest peak and like the Tail of the Dragon, at Deal's Gap, a draw for adventure riders who want to "Tame





the Beast", each time doing it a little bit faster. While there, I enjoyed a strudel and coffee at the edge of Pasterze Glacier. I rediscovered Staller Sattel Pass. Its twisty one-lane road is only open for fifteen minutes every hour. At the top of the hour traffic is permitted

to travel down into Italy. After fifteen minutes traffic is stopped and at the bottom of the hour it is permitted in the reverse direction going into Austria. It is a motorcyclist dream for a tight Alpine Road with no oncoming traffic. Each end has a traffic light had a gate and a countdown clock. The motorcycles are all permitted at the front of the line of cars just waiting for the green light. As the excitement builds you sit enjoying the view

of the cloud covered mountain range that lays before you. Glorious!

All my meals at the Penzion were served at a small table with a Blue Knight Snow Globe, which the

In Breslau, Poland I joined a German Knight and an Italian friend, with their wives, climbing Breslau Bell tower to view the city before strolling its medieval byways. they all spoke English. There was a festival in the town of Mielno, Poland the night we staved. Located on the Black Sea with an amusement park, it was three miles from our gated lodging. but I didn't care because

to our patio and enjoyed the camaraderie. A violinist performed poolside that night. I do not know why he was there, but we enjoyed his performance and shared our Polish Vodka with him after he was done. That night was a true example of the Brotherhood of the Blue Knights. We ate picnic, we drank Polish, and they spoke and laughed in English for me.

In Szczecin, Poland the hotel opened a side door, covered the floor in plastic and invited all forty motorcycles to park in one of their conference rooms. I watched in amazement as the bikes rode up the sidewalk and martialed into the carpeted room.



There we were met by members of Blue Knights 1 and given a tour of the city ending at an amusement park. Many of us viewed the lighted city across the Oder River from the top of the Ferris Wheel.

After the group disbanded, I visited a few more feudal cities on my return trip. In Quedlinburg, Germany I stayed on the main square and enjoyed a local festival for two days. Each evening they had a vast assortment of music performers. For me, the most memorable was either the marching drum band or the Irish Folk group made up of Germans singing in English with an Irish accent!

From a brother Knight, I learned of the Panzer Museum in Munster, Germany, before learning there are TWO Munsters in Germany (NOT Herman and Lilly) and they are nowhere near each other. I spent the whole of one morning's breakfast trying to learn the difference between Munster and the other Münster, trying to figure out which one had the Panzer Tanks. Locating the correct one I booked a room and enjoyed an afternoon wandering through history. I then returned to Heidelberg and visited the Technik Museum Sinsheim, a transport museum, which had everything from cars of the 30s, 40s, and 50s to Tanks and Planes. I depleted a fully

charged camera battery, just taking photos, but I was happy.

I was grateful I had had the COVID inoculation last Spring because it

was required for my travel. Europe requires special masks, but Lufhansa provided me with one and I purchased several more when I arrived. Most of the Western Countries require masks everywhere, so I kept one mask right next to my wallet and passport. Some hotels required showing proof of vaccination before checking in. At one gas station I was instructed to take my coffee outside, as I was unmasked while drinking. In the Eastern Countries the requirements were a lot more lax. In Heidelberg they have testing stations that give you a response in 18 hours. So, for a fee, I had an e-mail confirmation I was COVID free for my return to the United States. By the way, Lufthansa was very understanding when I tried to rebook my flight. However, they could not get me a return flight until a week after my intended departure. Another week on my bike? I had no complaint. So, my two-week mini vacation finally ended five weeks later.

The Blue Knights' Brotherhood is still alive and well. I was warmly greeted, by old friends, and met many new ones from all over Europe. English is widely accepted, in Europe and I rarely had a problem. I am grateful for the comradeship which the

Blue Knights provide and the new destinations which their events offer. Ride With Pride!



SOME THINGS TO CHECK WHEN YOU GET YOUR BIKE OUT OF WINTER STORAGE

CHECK THE TIRES — After sitting for a while, especially in colder temperatures, your tire pressure has likely gone down. Check both tires and make sure you have correct PSI. While you're down there, inspect the sidewalls and the tread for wear.


CHECK/CHARGE THE BATTERY — Hopefully you remembered to remove the battery and bring it inside to charge, or you hooked up the battery tender to the bike when you put it away for the winter. If so, a quick once-over should be all that's required; look for corrosion around the terminal posts and evidence of leaks

INSPECT THE DRIVETRAIN — You may have different things to check depending on if you have chain, belt, or shaft.

CHANGE THE OIL — If you didn't change the oil when you stored the bike in the fall, you definitely need to do it now.

PRE-RIDE CHECK — Start it up and check to make sure everything to include bulbs, headlight, horn etc. are still functioning correctly. Squeeze those brakes too. Make sure that everything is working as it should be and no animals chewed up anything.

NOW TAKE A TEST RIDE. You might want to make your first ride of the season a short one just in case something happens (like a battery decides it's had enough).





Lee Hirtle is a retired New Hampshire State Trooper, was a member of both the Army and Air Force and retired as an E-8 (Senior Master Sergeant) from the New Hampshire Air National Guard as a member of our Security Forces. Lee is a member in good standing in NH IV and is one of our Charter members who is still very active in our Chapter. Lee plays TAPS at the New Hampshire State Veteran's Cemetery



for Veterans funerals. Lee has said often that it is his obligation to play a live version of TAPS for our fallen Vets so that no Veteran's family must listen to a "fake" trumpet that plays a recording. To demonstrate his commitment to our Veterans, in 2007, he sounded his first TAPS at a military funeral.

On May 3, 2017, Lee performed military honors at a ceremony for his 3,000th time as a volunteer and on June 21, 2020, he performed military honors at a ceremony and played TAPS for his 4,700th funeral. He continues to render honors to date. Lee will go anywhere to play TAPS for any VETERAN and will not accept any payment for his services. He has set up a ride for our Chapter for this August to attend the New Hampshire Veterans' Cemetery where he will play TAPS. We have invited New Hampshire I to also attend and then we will go to our State Law Enforcement Memorial in Concord, where he will play TAPS. We then expanded the ride and invited the Chapters of the New Hampshire Red Knights, where we will then go to our State Firefighter's Memorial in Concord where he will play TAPS there as well. The New Hampshire Red Knights will have

their own annual ceremony at the NH Veterans' Cemetery later in August, and Lee volunteered to play TAPS for them as well. We, as a Chapter, will also attend and support our brothers in red.

Lee continues to be active in our Chapter, heading up our committee to design and purchase a monument to go on display at our New Hampshire Veteran's Cemetery that will recognize our Brothers and Sisters who have dedicated their lives to both our military and law enforcement services. Lee is extremely humble and would much rather work in the shadows as opposed to being out front but his service to our country, our state, our Chapter, and the Blue Knights in general really requires us to bring his acts out in the forefront. While leaving NY X's Monthly November 2020 meeting with pouring rain, Brian was traveling N/B on the Meadowbrook Parkway at 8:30 PM when traffic suddenly came to a screeching halt. Brian observed a white van with extensive front end damage facing S/B in the center of the N/B lane. Brian pulled over just north of

the van and ran over to the van. While people were gathering on the scene, there were 2 FDNY fireman trying to open the passenger door. They managed to pry open the passenger side door to find the passenger unconscious and pinned inside the vehicle.

After accessing the vehicle and determining there was no risk of fire, they stabilized the passenger until an ambulance arrived on the scene. The driver was inaccessible due to the extensive damage to the van They also checked the driver to find out he had a pulse. Brian managed to break the rear window to the van to gain access from the rear, but the back of the van was covered in open cans of spilled paint, as there was a divider between the front and rear making it impossible to reach the driver.

Once the FD arrived, Brian assisted with traffic, removing the trundle out of the ambulance while the paramedics were working on the driver. Once the driver was removed from the van, he was pronounced DOA at the scene. NY X Treasurer Brian Adams went above and beyond the call of duty. It was unfortunate that a life was lost at the scene, but it should be recognized that Brian, along with the two FDNY fireman also saved a life.

It is very clear from all parties involved that Officer Paulhus turned to his training and experience that ultimately saved this eight-month-old babies life. Officer Paulhus is a 37-year veteran of the Tilton Police Department, retiring in 2014 at the rank of Lieutenant and now working as a part time officer. Richard "Dickie" Paulhus is also an active member of the Blue Knights NH IV and we as a Chapter are extremely proud of him for the actions that he took.

Approximately four years ago, Randy and his wife. Kristin. witnessed a car roll over on the rain-slick highway while they were traveling to visit family. Randy immediately stopped, had me dial 911 and ran to the scene. Randy took control of the situation. Inside the car was an elderly lady who

was not wearing her seat belt and we found her lying in the back seat. The car was crumpled but Randy managed to pull open the passenger side rear door with some others help. He crawled into the back of the car and began first aid.

Other people came to the crash and asked what to do. Randy began telling folks what to do, including traffic control as the police and EMT's would need a path to get to the scene. All the windows were broken so he had several get coats and umbrellas to stop the rain from rolling into the car, he took off his coat and put it over her to try to prevent shock. He attended to the lady's cuts and injuries and kept her awake asking her questions and talking to her. There was no room for anyone else to get in the car, so he had to hold her up straight and not allow her to move fearing back, neck and/or internal injuries.

About 20 minutes later, the fire department, EMT's and state patrol arrived, and Randy gave them a quick assessment of everything he knew about her and her injuries. He helped in the extraction and loading of the lady applying neck and back braces under the EMT's instructions.

As they loaded the lady in the ambulance and left for the hospital, it was apparent the professionals appreciated what he did. One asked what department he worked at, thinking he was an EMT, fireman or police officer (maybe because he was wearing his Blue Knight t-shirt). Randy told them he was not any of them but an honorary with the Blue Knights. Several firemen and the police officer shook his hand or patted him on the back letting him know what a great job he did. He was exhausted mentally and physically. I was never prouder of him than that moment.

Later that following week, he felt compelled to check on the lady not knowing if she survived or if she had already left the hospital. Asking a few friends to check on the lady's accident, he found out she did survive and eventually found the lady was in a room at UT Hospital in Knoxville. There he met her and her brother. Both were from up north and that day of the accident, the lady was traveling alone to see her daughter and grandchildren. The lady did not remember the accident or anything until she woke up in the hospital.

She said, "When I wrecked, I asked God for help, and I only remember seeing an Angel that God had sent me who kept telling me everything was going to be OK". That is what Randy kept telling her during the entire time in the car. She knows that God had sent Randy for her. Randy has now taken accident scene management classes and certified training to be able to help injured people during accidents and to become more knowledgeable how to treat and what to look for.






New Jersey XV Donates NYPD Foundations


